COP-14 Highlights & Outcomes

Lisa and Jim provided a quick overview of the Council's objectives, activities and achievements at the COP-14 meeting in Poznan. Comments from delegation participants included:

- Daily correspondence on-the-ground very useful
- Dinner a huge success, access to key delegates impressive
- Need to think about most effective venue for conveying Council messages at the COPs, whether it is via side events, or some new approach

2009 Work Plan

Overall objectives include:

- Engage in 2009 UNFCCC negotiations
- Define post-2012 policy priorities and develop positions papers on key Bali Plan of Action issues
- Build relationships and profile with Congress and new Administration through DC-based advocacy events and private meetings
- Strengthen working relationships with other business groups and ICSE

Next 3 months (Feb – April)

- Brainstorming sessions/briefings with Congressional staff on issues such as offsets, market design, etc
- Reach out to Congressional Committees to provide hearing witnesses
- Develop one-pagers on BCSE views on key building block issues: Shared Vision, Mitigation, Targets & Timetables, Adaptation, Technology Transfer and Finance

Comments:

- Support for engaging the U.S. State Department early, as well as putting the Council's principles in writing as soon as possible
- NAIMA expressed interest in Council members participating in the *May 24-26 World Business Summit on Climate Change* in Copenhagen, good place to raise Council profile and possibly recruit members
